Past-President Attends 2003 World's Fair of Money

ANA World's Fair of Money, July 31 - August 3, 2003, **Baltimore, Maryland**

I had the pleasure of attending my first ANA convention last Saturday. August 2, and thought I would share what I found. At the meeting I told everyone that I was going to make the journey to see four of the five 1913 "V" nickels, and I saw them. Oddly enough, I saw all 5 of them, since the fifth coin was added to the exhibit at the last minute. The display was tall and enclosed in thick plastic (clear) so that everyone could see the coins and the brief history of who the current owners are, but as a collector, I was disappointed because I could not see much of the coins, themselves. Oh, they were there, but they were vertical to the floor, so I could not (easily) get a look at the coin with the light reflected across it. That would have allowed me to better see the surface of the coins, but I guess when you can't get closer than 3 feet, it may not have made much difference. Don't get me wrong, I am not complaining, since I actually saw the coins, and can tell my grandchildren that I saw all 5 of them at the same time. I guess my expectations were a little higher than security would allow.

There was a good sized line (8 or 10 people, minimum,) whenever I looked in the direction of the display, but the wait was worth it.

Immediately after entering the convention, I saw Ray Lockwood and Jerry Lebo (ICC Life Member) manning the Central States Numismatic Society (CSNS) booth, and said hello. They were the only two people I saw, other than dealers, whom I knew.

The bourse was swarming with people, and the dealers had many exciting coins, as well as some not-so-exciting. I was looking for 1896-S and 1897-S half-dollars in VG condition. I found several which were presented as VG, but did not quite measure up to the ANA grading standards (or the Vinton Dove standards!). I did find another MS Mercury Dime for the set that Allen and I are assembling. It was a 1917-S, not a full-strike, and would probably grade MS-62 or 63.

I saw several dealers whom I recognized. Among them were Leon Hendrickson's brother at the Silvertown booths: Orv Detrick at ROMA Coin's booth; Mike Orlando, at his booth; and J. Cline at his booth. Some of you may remember that J. Cline was the speaker at ICC's Christ-



GARY E. LEWIS AND WILLIAM H. HORTON JR. ELECTED NEW ANA PRESIDENT AND VP; THREE NEW GOVERNORS TO JOIN BOARD

A new president and vice president, and three new and four incumbents have been elected to the American Numismatic Association (ANA) nine-member Board of Governors, with 8,544 ballots cast in the biennial election. ANA Vice President Gary E. Lewis of Cape Coral, Florida, was elected president, defeating ANA Governor Patricia A. Finner of Iola, Wisconsin. Lewis received 4,589 votes to Finner's 3,827. In the contested election for the vice presidency, Governor William H. Horton Jr. of Keyport, New Jersey, defeated Governor Kay Edgerton Lenker of San Diego, California, by a vote of 4,391 to 3,919. New Board members are Alan Herbert, Donald H. Kagin and Will Rossman, Incumbents re-elected are M. Remy Bourne, Arthur M. Fitts III, Barry Stuppler and John Wilson. Lewis, a 43-year life member of the ANA, was first elected to the Board of Governors in 1995 and has served on the ANA's Audit, Finance, Exhibit, Resolutions, Mediation, Commemorative Quarter and Young

Numismatists Committees. He also has served as a regional, district and club representative and is the 1979 recipient of the ANA Outstanding Adult Advisor Award. Horton, a 31-year life member of the ANA, was first elected to the Board of Governors in 2001. The general chairman of the 2000 ANA World's Fair of Money in Philadelphia, he is a co-founder and first president of the Garden State Numismatic Association, and has served as president of a number of other clubs. Horton has served on a number of committees for the ANA and been recognized by several clubs for his outstanding contributions. All members of the ANA Board of Governors elected this year will assume office during the Association's 112th Anniversary Convention in Baltimore, Maryland, July 30 - August 3. Installation of officers will take place at the convention banquet on Saturday, August 2. Votes garnered by the winning candidates, as tabulated by the independent accounting firm of Biggs Kofford & Company are:

* 4,800 for M. Remy Bourne of Vadnais Heights, Minnesota * 4,260 for Michael S. Fey of Morris Plains, New Jersey * 4,799 for Arthur M. Fitts III of Framingham, Massachusetts * 4,576 for Alan Herbert of Belle Fourche, South Dakota * 5,749 for Donald H. Kagin of Tibourn, California * 4,195 for Bob Korver of Carollton, Texas * 3,649 for Walter A. Ostromecki Jr. of Panorama City, California * 4,289 for Will Rossman of Estes Park, Colorado * 4,939 for Stuppler of Woodland Hills, California * 3,375 for Anthony Tumonis of Tucson, Arizona * 5,918 for John Wilson of Ocala, Florida.

Nearly 30 percent of the eligible ANA voting membership cast ballots in this election; nearly 28 percent voted in the ANA election two years ago.



History of the Nickel, Part Three

In 1883, the U.S. Mint issued the Liberty Head nickel, designed by William Barber, whose son would follow him as chief engraver of the Mint, and whose name would be attached to the 1892-1916 silver coinage of that name. Although an attractive design with the Liberty Head and Roman numeral "V", for five, on the reverse (Victorian-era people thought that Roman numerals looked "classier" than Arabic numerals), Barber omitted one crucial element of the design - the word "cents". This might have not been a problem, had it not been for the fact that, at that time, the five dollar gold coin was the same size. Enterprising individuals started gold-plating the nickels and passing them as five dollar gold coins, which was a hefty profit in those days. These so called "Racketeer Nickels" became such a problem that the Mint hurriedly corrected the design before the end of 1883. They replaced the "E Pluribus Unum" motto at the bottom of the coin with the word "cents". Some of the individuals who made the instant "five dollar nickels" even went through the trouble of reeding the edges, since the five dollar gold coin has a reeded edge. Oddly enough, many people thought that the "centless" variety would be recalled by the Mint, so this coin was widely hoarded. Even today, it is one of the most inexpensive 19th century coin to be found in uncirculated condition. Even though the 1883 "with cents" variety had more than three times the mintage figure of the earlier type, the "with cents" is much scarcer in uncirculated condition. No further changes were made to the coin until it was discontinued, at the "official" end of the series in 1912. This final year featured branch Mint issues from Denver and San Francisco, and the 1912-S is considered to be a "key" date along with the 1885 and 1886 in this series, due to low mintage.

Although no official minting of 1913 Liberty Head Nickels was recorded, since the design was being replaced by the Buffalo or Indian Head nickel of that year, a Mint employee struck some of these very rare coins. Only five are known to exist. No one knew they existed until 1919, when they were displayed at the ANA convention that year. The coin became one of the most famous

American rarities thanks to Texas coin dealer E. Max Mehl, who, in the 1920's and 1930's through his Star coin catalogue, caused millions of people to look through their change in hopes of finding the rare coin. He had a standing offer to buy any of the coins. Thanks to Mr. Mehl, the 1913 Liberty nickel joined such coins as the 1804 dollar, the 1909 S VDB cent, and the 1955 double die cent as rare coins known to the general non-collecting public. Although the 1913 Liberty nickel, like many other "unofficially struck" mint issues, could be subject to seizure as unauthorized issues, the U.S. Mint has never pressed this policy, except in the case of the 1933 twenty dollar gold coin, and threatened seizure of 1964 D Peace Dollars and 1974 pattern aluminum cents.


